modern design Its excess would be directly challenged by the movements that followed II Art Nouveau 1890-1910 Nature's Embrace As a reaction against Victorian overindulgence Art Nouveau emerged celebrating organic forms inspired by nature Curvilinear lines flowing patterns and stylized floral motifs characterized this style Architecture Antoni Gaudí's works in Barcelona are prime examples showcasing flowing lines and intricate detailing inspired by nature Buildings incorporated stained glass mosaics and sculpted elements Interior Design Furniture featured graceful curves and natural materials like wood and wrought iron Interior spaces often incorporated stained glass and plant motifs Industrial Design Art Nouveau influenced posters jewelry and decorative objects emphasizing handcrafted quality and artistic expression Graphic Design The style's flowing lines and organic forms were prominently used in posters and advertisements characterized by the use of stylized lettering and flowing curves Alphonse Mucha is a key figure in this context Photography Art Nouveau's influence on photography was less direct than in other design fields though the aesthetics' emphasis on organic forms can be seen in some artistic photographic work III The Modern Movement 1920s-1970s Form Follows Function The early 20th century witnessed a radical shift towards Modernism a design philosophy emphasizing functionality simplicity and clean lines This movement rejected the ornamentation of past styles in favor of a more austere aesthetic Architecture The Bauhaus school in Germany significantly influenced modern architecture advocating for functional design and the use of new materials like steel and concrete Le Corbusier Mies van der Rohe and Frank Lloyd Wright were key figures championing minimalist forms and open floor plans Interior Design Modern interiors prioritized functionality and minimalism Furniture was characterized by simple forms clean lines and the use of new materials like chrome and plastic Industrial Design The focus shifted to mass production of well-designed affordable products The rise of industrial designers like Dieter Rams emphasized usability and timeless aesthetics Graphic Design Modernist graphic design embraced simplicity geometric forms and sans serif typography The use of photography became increasingly important in advertising and corporate branding Photography Modernist photography emphasized clean lines geometric composition and a documentary approach often focusing on social issues and architectural subjects IV Postmodernism and Beyond 1970s-Present Eclecticism and Beyond Postmodernism emerging in the latter half of the 20th century reacted against the perceived sterility of Modernism It embraced eclecticism mixing historical styles and incorporating irony and playful elements Architecture Postmodern architecture often features playful forms unexpected juxtapositions and a rejection of strict functionalism Architects like Robert Venturi challenged the Modernist dogma Interior Design Postmodern interiors are
