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carefully examining the arguments for and against moral relativism cook exposes not only that anthropologists have failed in their attempt to support relativism with evidence of cultural differences but that moral absolutists have been equally unsuccessful in their attempts to refute it he argues that these conflicting positions are both guilty of an artificial and unrealistic view of morality cook undertakes to show that a more subtle and complex account of morality reveals that moral relativism and moral absolutism must both be rejected a pathbreaking book morality and cultural differences deftly illustrates how philosophy when patiently pursued can be relevant to our everyday concerns this accessible and cogent work is an ideal text for beginning and advanced students of ethics philosophy and anthropology anyone interested in the debate surrounding cultural relativism will find it to be engaging reading

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a thought provoking examination of how explanations of social and moral development inform our understandings of morality and culture a common theme in the latter part of the twentieth century has been to lament the moral state of American society and the decline of morality among youth a sharp turn toward an extreme form of individualism and a lack of concern for community involvement and civic participation are often blamed for the moral crisis Turiel challenges these views drawing on a large body of research from developmental psychology anthropology sociology as well as social events political movements and journalistic accounts of social and political struggles Turiel shows that generation after generation has lamented the decline of society and blamed young people using historical accounts he persuasively argues that such characterizations of moral decline entail stereotyping nostalgia for times past and a failure to recognize the moral viewpoint of those who challenge traditions

the ethics of cultural appropriation undertakes a comprehensive and systematic investigation of the moral and aesthetic questions that arise from the practice of cultural appropriation explores cultural appropriation in a wide variety of contexts among them the arts and archaeology museums and religion questions whether cultural appropriation is always morally objectionable includes research that is equally informed by empirical knowledge and general normative theory provides a coherent and authoritative perspective gained by the collaboration of philosophers and specialists in the field who all participated in this unique research project

the essays in cultural pluralism and moral knowledge deal with philosophical issues that arise from the existence of a diversity of cultural traditions the discussions range from broad examinations of the relevance of cultural pluralism to morality to studies of specific cultural practices some essays explore the relationship between pluralism and political theory some contrast pluralism with relativism or distinguish it from reasonable disagreement others propose and defend a set of principles that apply to all societies forming the foundation of a common moral system still others delve into questions of moral psychology attempting to explain why people hold the values they do

this book presents the results of an experiment in interdisciplinary collaboration to clarify theories of morality and anthropology and philosophy showing how each may be enriched by borrowing from the other pooling the resources and methods of their respective fields anthropology and philosophy may and abraham edel examine the wide range of moral differences in the world to establish coordinates for the more systematic mapping of particular moralities to explore more explicitly the relations of morality to cultural patterns and social processes and to see how philosophic issues of ethical theory become refined and reformulated when their cultural content is made manifest the book contains an implicit suggestion that the anthropologist should focus on morality as an independent area of study and that the philosopher should stop treating morality in isolation anthropology tends to include morality as an incidental part of other inquiries philosophy on the other hand tends to cut morality off from the framework of psychological and cultural processes the result is a kind of deadlock in ethical theory the edels observe that to develop a working concept of morality at least as well developed as that furnished for religion anthropology can benefit from philosophic methods of analyzing concepts and from philosophical ways of conceptualizing problems of ethical theory on the other hand philosophy can use the methods of anthropology to approach morality in more meaningful terms this study is not addressed only to professionals its aim rather is to provide an orientation to morality itself in a world in which human problems are becoming extremely complex and have to be confronted directly as moral

moral philosophy a contemporary introduction is a compact yet comprehensive book offering an explication and critique of the major theories that have shaped philosophical ethics engaging with both historical and contemporary figures this book explores the scope limits and requirements of morality denicola traces our various attempts to ground morality in nature in religion in culture in social contracts and in aspects of the human person such as reason emotions caring and intuition

it is widely acknowledged that all archaeological research is embedded within cultural political and economic contexts and that all archaeological research falls under the heading heritage most archaeologists now work in museums and other cultural institutions government agencies non government organisations and private sector companies and this diversity ensures that debates continue to proliferate about what constitutes appropriate professional ethics within these related and relevant contexts discussions about the ethics of cultural heritage in the 20th century focused on standards of professionalism stewardship responsibilities to stakeholders and on establishing public trust in the authenticity of the outcomes of the heritage process this volume builds on recent approaches that move away from treating ethics as responsibilities to external domains and to the discipline and which seek to ensure ethics are integral to all heritage theory practice and methods the chapters in this collection chart a departure from the tradition of external heritage ethics towards a broader approach underpinned by the turn to human rights issues of social justice and the political economy of heritage conceptualising ethical responsibilities not as pertaining to the past but to a future focused domain of social action

this book has two principal themes first it is addressed to those who work for corporations many christians have been taught to feel at best faint disdain for corporations and those who manage them in contrast novak knows that many most business men and women are ethical people who yearn for moral guidance and advice consequently theology tackles a basic moral question can a christian work for a corporation novak s answer yes yet novak recognized that anyone who purported to think about practical business ethics needed to understand the predominant form of business organization the public corporation much of theology is thus devoted to an analysis of the corporation is the firm s structure as a bureaucratic hierarchy consistent with church teaching on human dignity what social responsibility if any does the corporation have and so forth thinking about those questions naturally lead novak to broader issues such as the consistency of capitalism with church teachings on wealth in theology therefore novak began working out the line of argument that was later developed more fully in his magisterial the spirit of democratic capitalism novak recognizes that church teaching has been hostile to capitalism as with much else of modernity yet novak contends that arguments against capitalism serve mainly to give aid and comfort to the leviathan state in the most controversial portions of theology novak attributes christian opposition to capitalism to two main sources ignorance and antique world views church leaders and theologians tend to be poorly trained in economics and inexperienced with the world of economic reality many believers again this is especially true of theologians are likely to inherit either a pre capitalist or a frankly socialist set of ideals about political economy as a result church leaders are more likely to err in this territory i e economic justice than in most others p 59 to be clear novak does not believe that faith should be subordinated to capitalism to the contrary he recognizes that the divine plan was that we should enjoy the fruits of the earth and of our own

industry he simply contends that capitalism is the best way fallen humans have yet devised to obey the biblical command that we are to be stewards of god's world novak never loses sight of the basic proposition that it was equally the divine plan that god should be worshiped obeyed and feared the fear of the lord he would argue is the beginning of capitalist wisdom just as it is of any other kind of wisdom not surprisingly therefore novak's analysis has begun to impact the way the church thinks about capitalism pope john paul ii's most recent encyclicals on work and the economy for example such as *Centesimus Annus* contain obvious marks of novak's influence
