in this revised new edition bayne and jinks expertly combine the professional and academic aspects of applied psychology the contributing authors all experts in their field provide authoritative and engaging overviews of their areas of expertise and an important range of perspectives the book is organised into three parts the first part is a general context for applied psychology including a discussion of questions about evidence based practice the second part discusses practice and training in a plethora of areas of applied psychology including all of the traditional routes for e g clinical health and educational psychology eight relative newcomers to the field for e g sport and forensic psychology and four areas not always regarded as applied psychology counselling coaching careers guidance and lecturing the innovative third part is a roundtable of expert practitioners commenting on the new directions they would like to see in their areas of applied psychology applied psychology research training and practice 2nd edition will be essential for all students considering a career in an applied field either those studying applied psychology at undergraduate level or msc students on applied psychology courses at this level

this volume explores the abiding intellectual inertia in scientific psychology in relation to the discipline's engagement with problematic beliefs and assumptions underlying mainstream research practices despite repeated critical analyses which reveal the weaknesses and in some cases complete inappropriateness of these methods such paradigmatic inertia is especially troublesome for a scholarly discipline claiming status as a science the book offers penetrating analyses of many albeit not all of the most important areas where mainstream practices require either compelling justifications for their continuation or adjustments possibly including abandonment toward more apposite alternatives specific areas of concern addressed in this book include the systemic misinterpretation of statistical knowledge the prevalence of a conception of measurement at odds with yet purporting to mimic the natural sciences the continuing widespread reliance on null hypothesis testing and the continuing resistance within psychology to the explicit incorporation of qualitative methods into its methodological toolbox broader level chapters examine mainstream psychology's systemic disregard for critical analysis of

its tenets and the epistemic and ethical problems this has created this is a vital and engaging resource for researchers across psychology and those in the wider behavioural and social sciences who have an interest in or who use psychological research methods

widespread use of qrps chapters examine the intentional use of qrps such as data fabrication and falsification along with subtler unintentional practices such as p hacking and harking hypothesizing after results are known drawing on the growing awareness of these problems contributors also highlight potential strategies to detect qrps and minimize their negative impact through open data practices preregistration of hypotheses and analyses and adversarial collaborations in which investigators holding opposing positions on a scientific issue agree to work together on a study in an effort to counteract their respective biases among the topics covered history of controversies in statistics and replication embracing intellectual humility while designing research confirmatory vs exploratory analyses publication bias and negative results promoting honest and transparent report writing avoiding questionable research practices in applied psychology provides a deeper understanding of how qrps impede the reliability and trustworthiness of findings in psychology and the social sciences it will be a practical useful resource for students and instructors in graduate and advanced undergraduate level research methods classes along with psychological researchers interested in improving their own research

constructing the subject traces the history of psychological research methodology from the nineteenth century to the emergence of currently favored styles of research in the second quarter of the twentieth century kurt danziger considers methodology to be a kind of social practice rather than simply a matter of technique therefore his historical analysis is primarily concerned with such topics as the development of the social structure of the research relationship between experimenters and their subjects as well as the role of the methodology in the relationship of investigators to each other in a wider social context the book begins with a historical discussion of introspection as a research practice and proceeds to an analysis of diverging styles of psychological investigation there is an extensive exploration of the role of quantification and statistics in the historical development of psychological research the influence of the social context on research practice is illustrated by a comparison of american and german developments especially in the field of personality research in this analysis psychology is treated less as a body of facts or theories than a particular set of social activities intended to produce something that counts as psychological knowledge under certain historical conditions this perspective means that the historical analysis has important consequences for a critical understanding of psychological methodology in general
