ethnographic fieldwork and interviews linda trinh vo traces the political strategies that enable asian americans to gender language and class differences among others she demonstrates that mobilization is not a smooth linear process and shows how the struggle over ideologies political strategies and resources affects the development of community organizations americans construct their relationship with asia and how they forge relationships with other racialized communities of color vo are situation in san diego illuminates other localities across the country where asians face challenges trying to organize find sufficient resources create leaders and define strategies

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
