this book focuses on the controversy recorded in 1 corinthians 15 regarding the denial of the resurrection of the dead many attempts and proposals have been made to understand the background of paul s opponents by focusing on the possible impact of stoicism albert v garcilazo argues that the internal evidence of the letter indicates that some of the corinthians had adopted a realized eschatology as well as an antisomatic view of the resurrection which in turn prompted them to reject the future resurrection of the dead garcilazo suggests that the higher status members of the congregation were influenced by the cosmological anthropological and ethical teachings of the stoia especially the tenets of the roman stoics he demonstrates this possibility by first considering the similarities between the doctrines of the corinthian dissenters and the teachings of the stoic philosophers particularly the teachings of seneca following a brief overview of stoicism the author concentrates on some of the theological issues revealed in the letter and examines how other scholars have interpreted 1 corinthians 15 finally he provides a detailed analysis of 1 corinthians 15 12 49 in short garcilazo argues that the philosophy of the stoics seemingly contributed to the resurrection controversy recorded in 1 corinthians 15

the undivided heart presents a history of legal and moral thought in jewish civilization from the earliest times until 200 ce it discusses israelite wisdom literature biblical law collections the prophets works of the hellenic jewish diaspora the apocrypha apocalypses the dead sea scrolls and the mishnah and it compares the moral teaching of the pharisees tannaim the essenes and jesus of nazareth among the book s important insights is that ancient israel experienced a fundamental moral change from people esteeming qualities and conduct having competitive value to people esteeming qualities and conduct having cooperative value these newly esteemed qualities and conduct were moreover not originally justified as being commanded by god but as promoting the nation s well being another important insight concerns jeremiah s belief that human beings would not be righteous until given a single heart although jeremiah is typically understood as envisioning the end of free will this book argues that jeremiah was actually envisioning the integration of human desires and emotions and that a single heart is better translated an undivided heart the notion of an undivided and a divided heart was used throughout the second temple period to explain respectively moral rectitude and moral failure

to understand the books of the new testament it is essential that the reader be made aware of the social cultural and historical contexts in which each of them was produced this commentary does just that for the acts of the apostles seeking to sensitize the reader to what is written in the text as well as the assumptions that lie behind it

presents a thorough study of the subject of herem in the old testament in second temple jewish literature in luke acts and in the new testament

widely used as a textbook since its publication in 1987 this work provides an analytical and systematic introduction to the roman greek and jewish political social literary and religious backgrounds necessary for a historical understanding of the new testament in the early church

because deception is usually considered immoral it is surprising to find so many occurrences of it within genesis often perpetrated by israel s venerated patriarchs while deception in genesis has been addressed in piecemeal fashion in previous studies this is the first time that it has been dealt with comprehensively this book analyzes this phenomenon from the perspectives of the bible itself later jewish exegetical tradition ancient near eastern parallels and folklore these perspectives unanimously indicate that the moral evaluation of deception in genesis is both complex and unique in the ancient and modern world

between horror and hope is a study of paul s metaphorical language of death in romans 6 1 11 the scholarly debate focuses on two main issues the origin of the *commentatio mortis* tradition and its development dr sabou argues that the origin of this terminology is original to paul that it was the apostle s own insight into the meaning of christ s death a death to sin and his understanding of the identity of christ in his death as the anointed davidic king which guided him to create this metaphor of dying to sin as a way of describing the relationship of the believer with sin on the development of this language of death the author argues that this language conveys two aspects horror and hope the first is discussed in the context of crucifixion in which paul explains the believer s death to sin by presenting christ s death as the death of the anointed davidic king who won the victory over sin and death by rising from the dead paul affirms that believers are coalesced with what was proclaimed about christ s death and resurrection thereby allowing him to assert that the releasing of the body from the power of sin is a result of crucifixion this crucifixion is the condemnation inflicted on our past lives in the age inaugurated by adam s sin and this is such a horrible event that believers have to stay away from sin since sin leads to such punishment in contrast hope is presented in the context of burial the believers burial with christ points to the fact that they are part of christ s family and this is accomplished by the overwhelming action of god by which he pushes us toward the event of christ s death an act pictured in baptism it is this burial with christ that allows believers to share with christ in newness of life

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
