in its classical form the study of argumentation focuses on human oriented uses of argument such as whether an argument is legitimate or flawed engagement in debate or the rhetorical aspects of argumentation in recent decades however the study of logic and computational models of argumentation has emerged as a growing sub area of ai this book presents the seventh international conference on computational models of argument comma 18 held in warsaw poland from 12 to 14 september 2018 since its inception in 2006 the conference and its related activities have developed alongside the steady growth of interest in computational argumentation worldwide and the selection of 25 full papers and 17 short papers out of a total of 70 submissions and 15 demonstration abstracts included here reflect the broad multidisciplinary nature of argumentation and the increasing body of work which establishes the relevance of computational models to various disciplines and real world applications subjects covered include algorithm development innovative applications argument mining argumentation based models of dialogue abstract argument frameworks and structured argumentation representing an overview of current developments in the field this book will appeal to all those with an interest in computational models of argument

english grammar structure and theme is a user friendly exploration of the structure of english which draws on readers knowledge of their own language throughout the text exploration activities lead the students to discover how the language works many examples are taken from real world sources enhancing the natural conversational tone the descriptive theory used in the text is clear understandable and easily accessible to a general nonspecialist audience while

using modern linguistic theory as its primary descriptive framework english grammar structure and theme thoroughly respects traditional grammatical descriptions traditional interpretations are presented along with more current theory in order to assist students in making the transition from one descriptive framework to another and to help them understand the rationale behind traditional rules consequently this text will be especially useful for students whose only exposure to english grammar has been minimal the instructor s exercise book provides exam questions plus complete model answers for all exercises english grammar structure and theme is an ideal choice for anyone who wants to learn more about language or modern linguistic theory but who finds most technical linguistic texts daunting it will be of value to language teachers technical writers and nonspecialists who want a general introduction to contemporary english grammar

this text introduces university students to the philosophical ethos of critical thinking as well as to the essential skills required to practice it the authors believe that critical thinking should engage students with issues of broader philosophical interest while they develop their skills in reasoning and argumentation the text is informed throughout by philosophical theory concerning argument and communication from aristotle s recognition of the importance of evaluating argument in terms of its purpose to habermas s developing of the concept of communicative rationality the authors treatment of the topic is also sensitive to the importance of language and of situation in shaping arguments and to the necessity in argument of some interplay between reason and emotion unlike many other texts in this area then good reasons for better arguments helps to explain both why argument is important and how the social role of argument plays an important part in determining what counts as a good argument if this text is distinctive in the extent to which it deals with the theory and the values of critical thinking it is also noteworthy for the thorough grounding it provides in the skills of deductive and inductive reasoning the authors present the reader with useful tools for the interpretation evaluation and construction of arguments a particular feature is the inclusion of a wide range of exercises rich with examples that illuminate the practice of argument for the student many of the exercises are self testing with answers provided at the back of the text others are appropriate for in class discussion and assignments challenging yet accessible good reasons for better arguments brings a fresh perspective to an essential subject

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
