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in the truth about stories native novelist and scholar thomas king explores how stories shape who we are and how we understand and interact with other people from creation stories to personal experiences historical anecdotes to social injustices racist propaganda to works of contemporary native literature king probes native culture s deep ties to storytelling thomas king weaves events from his own life as a child in california an academic in canada and a native north american with a wide ranging discussion of stories told by and about indians that imaginative indian that north americans hold dear has been challenged by native writers n scott momaday leslie marmon silko louis owens robert alexie and others who provide alternative narratives of the native experience that question a past create a present and imagine a future king reminds the reader native and non native that storytelling carries with it social and moral responsibilities book jacket

a rare and inspiring guide to the health and well being of aboriginal women and their communities the process of digging up medicines of rediscovering the stories of the past serves as a powerful healing force in the decolonization and recovery of aboriginal communities in life stages and native women kim anderson shares the teachings of fourteen elders from the canadian prairies and ontario to illustrate how different life stages were

experienced by metis cree and anishinaabe girls and women during the mid twentieth century these elders relate stories about their own lives the experiences of girls and women of their childhood communities and customs related to pregnancy birth post natal care infant and child care puberty rites gender and age specific work roles the distinct roles of post menopausal women and women s roles in managing death through these teachings we learn how evolving responsibilities from infancy to adulthood shaped women s identities and place within indigenous society and were integral to the health and well being of their communities by understanding how healthy communities were created in the past anderson explains how this traditional knowledge can be applied toward rebuilding healthy indigenous communities today

this book examines the challenges and possibilities of conducting cultural environmental history research today disciplinary commitments certainly influence the questions scholars ask and the ways they seek out answers but some methodological challenges go beyond the boundaries of any one discipline the book examines how to account for the fact that humans are not the only actors in history yet dominate archival records how to attend to the non visual senses when traditional sources offer only a two dimensional non sensory version of the past how to decolonize research in and beyond the archives and how effectively to use sources and means of communication made available in the digital age this book will be a valuable resource for those interested in environmental history and politics sustainable development and historical geography

preaching the manifold grace of god is a two volume work describing theologies of preaching from the historical and contemporary periods volume 1 focuses on historical theological families orthodox roman catholic lutheran reformed anabaptist anglican episcopal wesleyan baptist african american stone campbell friends and pentecostal volume 2 focuses on families that are evangelical liberal neo orthodox postliberal existential radical orthodox deconstructionist black liberation womanist latinx liberation mujerista asian american asian american feminist lgbtqai indigenous postcolonial and process in each case the author describes the circumstances in which the theological family emerged describes the purposes and characteristics of preaching from that perspective and assesses the strengths and limitations of the approach

troubling tricksters is a collection of theoretical essays creative pieces and critical ruminations that provides a re visioning of trickster criticism in light of recent backlash against it the complaints of some indigenous writers the critique from indigenous nationalist critics and the changing of academic fashion have resulted in few new studies on the trickster for example the cambridge companion to native american literature 2005 includes only a brief mention of the trickster with skeptical commentary and in 2007 anishinaabe scholar niigonwedom sinclair a contributor to this volume called for a moratorium on studies of the trickster irrelevant to the specific experiences and interests of indigenous nations one of the objectives of this anthology is then to encourage scholarship that is mindful of the critic s responsibility to communities and to focus discussions on incarnations of tricksters in their particular national contexts the contribution of troubling tricksters therefore is twofold to offer a timely counterbalance to this growing critical lacuna and to propose new approaches to trickster studies approaches that have been clearly influenced by the nationalists call for cultural and historical specificity

recent decades have seen a tremendous upsurge of interest among the indigenous peoples of australia and new zealand in their history life stories land claims genealogy song dance and painting have all made new contributions to the recovery and representation of the past telling stories looks at the place of life stories and of memory in history who tells life stories the purpose for which they are told the role of story and history in the politics of land claims

and the way language impacts on research and writing ann parsonson writes about stories for land in the oral narratives of the maori land court deborah rose bird retells the saga of captain cook andrew erueti and alan ward examine maori land law in the context of the treaty claims process jeremy beckett looks at the autobiographical oral history of myles lalor and bain attwood discusses the stolen generations narrative with judith binney fiona magowan w h oliver basil sansom and penny van toorn these contributors explore the questions arising when different kinds of history meet different kinds of evidence from different cultures sometimes telling the same story from conflicting perspectives telling stories is a timely book that freely explores the multiple forms of indigenous history in new zealand and australia

the first comprehensive study of north american indigenous languages as the basis of textualized orality in indigenous literatures in english drawing on a significant indigenous language structure the holophrase one word sentence neuhaus proposes holophrastic reading as a culturally specific reading strategy for orality in indigenous writing in readings of works by ishmael alunik inuvialuit alootook ipellie inuit richard van camp dogrib thomas king cherokee and louise bernice halfe cree she demonstrates that para holophrases the various transformations of holophrases into english language discourse textualize orality in indigenous literatures by grounding it in indigenous linguistic traditions neuhaus s discussion points to the paraholophrase the functional equivalent of the holophrase as a central discourse device in indigenous writing and as a figure of speech in its own right building on interdisciplinary research this groundbreaking study not only links oral strategies in indigenous writing to indigenous rhetorical sovereignty but also points to ancestral language influences and indigenous rhetoric more generally as areas for future research cover

an international outlook on the different aspects of critical pedagogy authors from around the global discuss the both philosophical and social common themes on the subject

first person accounts of takatāpui men and women which include poetry prose and deeply personal narratives

qualitative inquiry in the public sphere examines the relationships between public scholarship the research marketplace and the politics of higher education it is written from the perspective that higher education is under attack from multiple sides both political and economic that academics reside in a precarious position one fraught with accountability metrics funding pressures and spiralling bureaucracy and that scientific knowledge itself is increasingly contentious in public these internal and external pressures have fundamentally transformed the public sphere of higher education from one of rational public discourse by and for the public good to one of private market relations and strategic research decisions in turn these transformations have fundamentally altered what it means to be a productive scholar within this space altered what it means to be a public researcher in this space leading international voices from the united states canada germany the united kingdom and norway collectively present a forceful rebuke to such developments raising a clarion call to action on topics ranging from scholarly publishing audit culture and the privatization of public knowledge to indigenous arts based and collaborative research methods qualitative inquiry in the public sphere is a must read for faculty and students alike interested in the politics of being a public researcher of conducting research in and influencing dialogue in the public sphere

just me with hearts as big as the outback rural and remote nurses are a dedicated and gutsy bunch who work selflessly to care for their communities often in isolated and inhospitable conditions with few resources but plenty of experience courage and care outback nurses deal with it all broken limbs labour pains snake bites sunburnt backpackers lost explorers vaccinations defibrillations even the occasional crook cattle dog one thing they are never short of is stories to tell this memorable and eye opening collection of real life accounts from nurses in the australian bush is by turns inspiring poignant heartbreaking and hilarious and swampy should know it was while he was researching this book he had a near fatal fall from a cliff in kakadu and experienced first hand the skill and heroism of these outback nurses in extraordinary situations bill swampy marsh is an award winning writer and performer of stories songs and plays he spent most of his youth in rural south western nsw and now lives in adelaide swampy is one of abc books bestselling authors of australian stories this is his sixteenth book

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
