the first systematic comprehensive reference covering the ideas genres and concepts behind digital media the study of what is collectively labeled new media the cultural and artistic practices made possible by digital technology has become one of the most vibrant areas of scholarly activity and is rapidly turning into an established academic field with many universities now offering it as a major

the johns hopkins guide to digital media is the first comprehensive reference work to which teachers students and the curious can quickly turn for reliable information on the key terms and concepts of the field the contributors present entries on nearly 150 ideas genres and theoretical concepts that have allowed digital media to produce some of the most innovative intellectual artistic and social practices of our time the result is an easy to consult reference for digital media scholars or anyone wishing to become familiar with this fast developing field

concerned with the nature of the medium and the borders between fact and fiction reflexivity was a ubiquitous feature of modernist and postmodernist literature and film while in the wake of the post postmodern return to the real cultural criticism has little time for discussions of reflexivity it remains a key topic in narratology as does fictionality the latter is commonly defined opposition to the real and the factual but remains conditioned by historical cultural discursive and medium related factors reflexivity blurs the boundaries between fact and fiction however by giving fiction a factual edge or by questioning the limits of factuality in non fictional discourses fictionality factuality and reflexivity thus constitute a complex triangle of concepts yet they are rarely considered together this volume fills this gap by exploring the intricacies of their interactions and interdependence in philosophy literature film and digital media providing insights into a broad range of their manifestations from the ancient times to today from east asia through europe to the americas

in the will to predict eglė rindzevičiūtė demonstrates how the logic of scientific expertise cannot be properly understood without knowing the conceptual and institutional history of scientific prediction she notes that predictions of future population economic growth environmental change and scientific and technological innovation have shaped much of twentieth and twenty first century politics and social life as well as government policies today such predictions are more necessary than ever as the world undergoes dramatic environmental political and technological change but she asks what does it mean to predict scientifically what are the limits of scientific prediction and what are its effects on governance institutions and society her intellectual and political history of scientific prediction takes as its example twentieth century ussr by outlining the role of prediction in a range of governmental contexts from economic and social planning to military strategy she shows that the history of scientific prediction is a transnational one part of the history of modern science and technology as well as governance going beyond the soviet case rindzevičiūtė argues that scientific predictions are central for organizing uncertainty through the orchestration of knowledge and action bridging the fields of political sociology organization studies and history the will to predict considers what makes knowledge scientific and how such knowledge has impacted late modern governance

with many illustrations and diagrams images of thought provides easy to follow ways in which to read indian persian and european paintings in terms of composition proportion colour symbolism and references to myth yet it also provides the intellectual contexts of islamic cultures which inform our perceptions of how this visual language works the author uses salient aspects of critical theory anthropology and theology to sensitise viewers to the diversity and difference of cultural readings but never loses sight of the primacy of the visual and formal characteristics gestures geometrical structures and their cooperation with myths and theologemes the book provides access to one of the world s major visual traditions whose characteristics continue to inform and elucidate indian and islamic contemporary thought today images of thought is a major scholarly and provocative

contribution not only to our understanding of cultural individuality but it offers important examples of how to engage in transcultural understanding and ways of seeing

in the first centuries bce and ce roman wall painters frequently placed representations of works of art especially panel paintings within their own mural compositions nathaniel b jones argues that the depiction of panel painting within mural ensembles functioned as a meta pictorial reflection on the practice and status of painting itself this phenomenon provides crucial visual evidence for both the reception of greek culture and the interconnected ethical and aesthetic values of art in the roman world roman meta pictures this book reveals not only navigated social debates on the production and consumption of art but also created space on the roman wall for new modes of expression relating to pictorial genres the role of medium in artistic practice and the history of painting richly illustrated

training artistic reflexivity in visual artists with over 30 images from her thesis exhibition reflex a trans disciplinary artist and educator in both acting and visual art jennifer completed her mfa in the interdisciplinary masters of art and design program at ocad university her research focus hybridized her theatre and visual art disciplines and adapted improvisational acting techniques into collaborative gestural drawing exercises for visual artists to train them to be more artistically reflexive how is the reflexive impulse recognized valued and taught to the visual artist reflexivity is the artistic response to the idea or impulse from the brain training reflexivity as a tool is not about training the impulse but about training the reflexive response to impulse acting pedagogy through improvisation and repetition improves the reflexive response using actor training methods that i have adapted into gestural drawing exercises visual artists can practice responding reflexively in collaboration with others learning and artistry are social processes they require embodied engagement with others to teach reflexivity and artistic individuality this research contributes new interdisciplinary language and innovative techniques to visual artist training and identifies artistic reflexivity as a trainable part of a developing artistic process

explores the range of issues and perspectives about the nature of knowledge and reflexive knowing this book shows how a concern with reflexivity can inform research methodologies and practice the text is intended for academics and researchers in communication and the sociology of knowledge

training artistic reflexivity in visual artists the exercises created in this guide use repetition and collaboration as a tool to practice taking risks and responding without thinking the collaborative environment makes risk taking feel more like playing which fosters a sense of community building trust and empathy students re discover how to play how to listen to their bodies impulses and how to reconnect with their curiosity through these playful exercises students strengthen their concentration and focus stretching their creative limits though incremental risk taking training artistic reflexivity is not about creating art but about training the reflexive impulse that allows art to happen training the reflexive impulse teaches the artist to say yes

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the strategy of postmodern appropriation that burgeoned into an international style in the 1980s is currently epitomised by the work of new york artists such as cindy sherman barbara kruger hans haacke and david salle this book examines the parallel yet highly original evolution of australia s leading appropriationist imants tillers the author argues that whereas the new york school was predominantly based on the appropriation of mass media imagery from 1975 onwards tiller turned to the appropriation of fine art imagery while the new york school was primarily oriented towards a deconstruction of the ideological signs of mass media tillers pioneered an alternative australian school of appropriation based on the deconstruction of authorship coulter smith also argues that the lack of authorial presence that arises out of tillers approach foregrounds the role of the viewer in the construction of meaning and in so doing expands the discourse of appropriation into the multi dimensional space of intertextuality book jacket

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
