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a new examination of nietzsche s radically original ideas on time and becoming

becoming nietzsche is an essential book for understanding nietzsche s philosophical genealogy from 1866 to 1868 a phase that is punctuated by the influence of friedrich lange and a surprising rejection of schopenhauer s theory of the will during this phase nietzsche focuses on the scientific and artistic status of teleological judgments and their relevance for thinking about organic life and representation paul a swift deftly connects nietzsche s philology with the development of his theory of human understanding by providing scholarly analysis and short original translations of nietzsche s early work on democritus

schopenhauer and kant a first of its kind study suitable for nietzsche specialists historians of philosophy and newcomers who have broad interests in the humanities becoming nietzsche investigates how democritus s rejection of teleology and kant s analysis of reflective judgment directly influenced nietzsche s aesthetic perspectivism in the 1860s

provocative and persuasive pletsch has illuminated the process by which a gifted but awkward philology student became one of the modern world s most original thinkers deserves to be read by anyone interested in the dynamics of creative influence and achievement

the trajectory of friedrich nietzsche s thought has long presented a difficulty for the study of his philosophy how did the young nietzsche classicist and ardent advocate of wagner s cultural renewal become the philosopher of will to power and the eternal return with this book laurence lampert answers that question he does so through his trademark technique of close readings of key works in nietzsche s journey to philosophy the birth of tragedy schopenhauer as educator richard wagner in bayreuth human all too human and sanctus januarius the final book of the 1882 gay science relying partly on how nietzsche himself characterized his books in his many autobiographical guides to the trajectory of his thought lampert sets each in the context of nietzsche s writings as a whole and looks at how they individually treat the question of what a philosopher is indispensable to his conclusions are the workbooks in which nietzsche first recorded his advances especially the 1881 workbook which shows him gradually gaining insights into the two foundations of his mature thinking the result is the most complete picture we ve had yet of the philosopher s development one that gives us a promethean nietzsche gaining knowledge even as he was expanding his thought to create new worlds

this book explores the significance of human animality in the philosophy of friedrich nietzsche and provides the first systematic treatment of the animal theme in nietzsche s corpus as a whole lemm argues that the animal is neither a random theme nor a metaphorical device in nietzsche s thought instead it stands at the center of his renewal of the practice and meaning of philosophy itself lemm provides an original contribution to on going debates on the essence of humanism and its future at the center of this new interpretation stands nietzsche s thesis that animal life and its potential for truth history and morality depends on a continuous antagonism between forgetfulness animality and memory humanity this relationship accounts for the emergence of humanity out of animality as a function of the antagonism between civilization and culture by taking the antagonism of culture and civilization to be fundamental for nietzsche s conception of humanity and its becoming lemm gives a new entry point into the political significance of nietzsche s thought the opposition between civilization and culture allows for the possibility that politics is more than a set of civilizational techniques that seek to manipulate dominate and exclude the animality of the human animal by seeing the deep seated connections of politics with culture nietzsche

orients politics beyond the domination over life and instead offers the animality of the human being a positive creative role in the organization of life lemm s book presents nietzsche as the thinker of an emancipatory and affirmative biopolitics this book will appeal not only to readers interested in nietzsche but also to anyone interested in the theme of the animal in philosophy literature cultural studies and the arts as well as those interested in the relation between biological life and politics

ecce homo is an autobiography like no other nietzsche passes under review all his previous books and reaches a final reckoning with his many enemies ecce homo is the summation of an extraordinary philosophical career

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an international team of scholars offer a broad engagement with the thought of friedrich nietzsche they discuss the main topics of his philosophy under the headings of values epistemology and metaphysics and will to power other sections are devoted to his life his relations to other philosophers and his individual works

it is commonly known that nietzsche is one of plato s primary philosophical antagonists yet

there is no full length treatment in english of their ideas in dialogue and debate plato and nietzsche is an advanced introduction to these two thinkers with original insights and arguments interspersed throughout the text through a rigorous exploration of their ideas on art metaphysics ethics and the nature of philosophy and by explaining and analyzing each man s distinctive approach mark anderson demonstrates the many and varied ways they play off against one another this book provides the background necessary to understanding the principle matters at issue between these two philosophers and to developing an awareness that nietzsche s engagement with plato is deeper and more nuanced than it is often presented as being

nietzsche s work was shaped by his engagement with ancient greek philosophy matthew meyer analyzes nietzsche s concepts of becoming and perspectivism and his alleged rejection of the principle of non contradiction and he traces these views back to the heraclitean protagorean position that plato and aristotle critically analyze in the theaetetus and metaphysica iv respectively at the center of this heraclitean protagorean position is a relational ontology in which everything exists and is what it is only in relation to something else meyer argues that this relational ontology is not only theoretically foundational for nietzsche s philosophical project in that it is the common element in nietzsche s views on becoming perspectivism and the principle of non contradiction but also textually foundational in that nietzsche implicitly commits himself to such an ontology in raising the question of opposites at the beginning of both human all too human and beyond good and evil

inspired by the ancient and medieval genre a nietzschean bestiary gathers essays treating the most vivid and lively animal images in one of the philosophic tradition s greatest bodies of work leading scholars treat specific animals such as the prowling beast of prey zarathustra s laughing lions and the notorious blond beast to ingeniously reveal how these creatures play a prominent role in the development of nietzsche s philosophy numerous essays explore the nature of human animality and our relations to other animals contributors shed new light on nietzsche s conception of power freedom and meaning research tools including discussions of nietzsche s influence on important twentieth century philosophers and the most extensive index of animal references in nietzsche s corpus make this an essential volume for scholars and students alike

m c dillon 1938 2005 was widely regarded as a world leading merleau ponty scholar his book merleau ponty s ontology 1988 is recognized as a classic text that revolutionized the philosophical conversation about the great french phenomenologist dillon followed that book with two others semiological reductionism a critique of early 1990s linguistic reductionism and beyond romance a richly developed theory of love at the time of his death dillon had nearly completed two further books to which he was passionately committed the first one offers a highly original interpretation of nietzsche s ontology of becoming the second offers

a detailed ethical theory based on merleau ponty s account of carnal intersubjectivity the ontology of becoming and the ethics of particularity collects these two manuscripts written by a distinguished philosopher at the peak of his powers manuscripts that taken together offer a distinctive and powerful view of human life and ethical relations

this exciting collection of essays challenges existing interpretations of several key moments of nietzsche s philosophy paul patton scientia professor of philosophy university of new south wales australia throughout his writing career nietzsche advocated the affirmation of earthly life as a way to counteract nihilism and asceticism this volume takes stock of the complexities and wide ranging perspectives that nietzsche brings to bear on the problem of life s becoming on earth by engaging various interpretative paradigms reaching from existentialist to darwinist readings of nietzsche in an age in which the biological sciences claim to have unlocked the deepest secrets and codes of life the essays in this volume propose a more skeptical view life is both what is closest and what is furthest from us because life experiments through us as much as we experiment with it because life keeps our thinking and our habits always moving in a state of recurring nomadism nietzsche s philosophy is perhaps the clearest expression of the antinomy contained in the idea of studying life and in the socratic ideal of an examined life and remains a deep source of wisdom about living

hiking with nietzsche is a tale of two philosophical journeys in the swiss alps one made by john kaag as an introspective teenager the other seventeen years later in radically different circumstances as a husband and father with his wife and small child in tow kaag travels to the peaks above sils maria where nietzsche routinely summered and where he wrote his mysterious landmark work thus spoke zarathustra both trips are made in search of the wisdom at the core of nietzsche s philosophy yet they bring kaag to radically different revelations about the human condition entertaining intimate and thought provoking hiking with nietzsche explores not only nietzsche s ideals but how his philosophy relates to us in the 21st century it is about defeating complacency balancing sanity and madness and coming to grips with the unobtainable as kaag hikes into the high places alone or with his family but always with nietzsche he finds that the process of climbing and the inevitable missteps give one the chance in nietzsche s words to become who you are even when we think it too late to change this most controversial of thinkers can inspire the rediscovery of meaning

friedrich nietzsche s intellectual autobiography ecce homo has always been a controversial book nietzsche prepared it for publication just before he became incurably insane in early 1889 but it was held back until after his death and finally appeared only in 1908 for much of the first century of its reception ecce homo met with a sceptical response and was viewed as merely a testament to its author s incipient madness this was hardly surprising since he is deliberately outrageous with the megalomaniacal self advertisement of his chapter titles and

brazenly claims i am not a man i am dynamite as he attempts to explode one preconception after another in the western philosophical tradition in recent decades there has been increased interest in the work especially in the english speaking world but the present volume is the first collection of essays in any language devoted to the work most of the essays are selected from the proceedings of an international conference held in london to mark the centenary of the first publication of ecce homo in 2008 they are supplemented by a number of specially commissioned essays contributors include established and emerging nietzsche scholars from the uk and usa germany and france portugal sweden and the netherlands

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
